DEAR COMMUNITY MEMBERS,

On April 18, 2023, the Willsboro Central School District Board of Education adopted the proposed budget of \$10,901,493 for the 2023-2024 school year, which will be voted on by the community on May 16, 2023. This budget

results in a tax levy increase of 2.07% which falls within the district's allowable state-calculated tax cap limit.

The proposed budget honors the district's responsibility to the community to use its resources as effectively and efficiently as possible while also focusing on academic excellence. The proposed budget continues all existing programs and services while also introducing new opportunities to support the overall well-being of our students.

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Throughout our budget development process, decision-making is aligned to our district mission to provide a safe and supportive community that instills students with PRIDE: PREPARED for the future that they choose, RESPECTED and valued for who they are, INSPIRED to make their community and world a better place, DETERMINED to overcome challenges, and EMPOWERED to engage with a changing world.

After you read the information within this newsletter, we encourage you to review the additional financial information available on our website. The detailed budget will also be available to the public on May 2, 2023 in the District Office.

We greatly appreciate the community's ongoing support of our students and staff and hope to see all eligible voters on Tuesday, May 16, 2023.



WILLSBORO TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM SPARKS CREATIVE FREEDOM

There's a world of new opportunities being offered at Willsboro Central School.

Career and Technical Education is now on that list of opportunities, and the Technology room is turning into the place to be.

Both the Conservation and Carpentry classes have become a hit among students, and it looks like there will be even more interest in years to come.

"Sometimes it's hard to get a student engaged at first with these classes,"Technology teacher Erik Manning said. "All of a sudden you see something spark them and you see that passion come through.

It's different for each student, but there's always that triggering event that gets them really interested."

PRIDE IN THEIR WORK

The materials students craft in carpentry have extra meaning. Most projects they work on are not just for a grade in the class. They end up being used in the community.

Lucas Drinkwine, a 10th-grader, has been busy in the shop making hammers and baseball bats as well as podiums for teachers and benches.



One of the benches he made stayed right at Willsboro and is stationed outside the music room, while another bench is in the works and will be sent over soon to Willsboro Golf Course.

"It's really nice knowing we can leave our mark on everything that we do and it ends up in our school or community. That bench that's outside the music room is great. Every time I walk by it, it's cool to know I made it and there's people sitting on it. One of the main reasons I took this class was I really wanted to just learn and see what I could make with my own two hands. It's been a great experience."



At the core of what is taught, safety is paramount.

"I want to align my curriculum with the industry standards for these kids," Manning said. "It's about safety, and then comes the work ethic. If I can instill those two things within the kids, that's the foundation they need in these classes."

CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT

The 2023-2024 capital outlay project will consist of work required to replace the district's existing phone and public address system. The current system is now over 20 years old and is no longer serviceable. Not only will a replacement system provide necessary upgrades for communication, but it will also allow for additional safety features to be implemented within the district.

The state allows school districts to transfer general funds to the capital fund for building and/or reconstruction projects not to exceed \$100,000. Projects funded in this manner receive reimbursement from the state the following budget year, unlike traditional capital projects, which are reimbursed over time. The state will reimburse Willsboro Central School District for 52% of this project.

"We have the freedom to do what we want each day, and that's something we appreciate," said 11th-grader Jameson Russell. "It's nice to learn skills like welding. It's great to look at those trade jobs whether it be for a full-time or part-time job in the future.

"I want to build essential skills and learn everything possible, especially with carpentry because there are a lot of jobs in this area if you have the knowledge and know what you are doing."

HAVING FUN AS A GROUP

A favorite for the conservation class is maple syrup. If you are thinking they all like maple syrup, that's probably true, but in this sense, it's the actual maple sugaring lesson Manning teaches.

"I mean who doesn't like maple syrup? That is my favorite lesson because the kids don't even realize all the other aspects they are learning — tree identification, forest management, forest health, maple sugaring industry, tree size, scaling," Manning said.

Even though the students don't always like when Manning drags them out into the cold and snow to head for the trees, he said he knows they are still having fun.

"They only hate me a bit when I have to bring them out in the cold," he said with a laugh.

But there's plenty of projects students are working on



inside as well.

One that summarizes how students are learning and supporting the community is the fresh company sign being crafted for Imerys.

"I stood over the sign the other day and just went, 'Wow, this is really coming together,' said Willsboro senior Abby Bruno. "I was really proud."

Bruno plans to go to college for art, so a project like this is perfect.

"This is different than just working with paint and paper," Bruno said. "You can explore some other things. It's been fun building up the sign instead of painting it flat. There are tons of resources in our shop for it, too.

"This really is a room of opportunity when we come in here. It feels like a second home."
