WCS Welcomes Peer Empowerment

Students at Willsboro Central School have set their sights on making a difference.

Peer Empowerment Leaders are leading the way at WCS.

Last spring, WCS began collaborating with Tom Bull and the staff of Building Resiliency in Essex County Families (BRIEF).

The program develops a school-district-wide, adult-guided peer-run, positive school culture utilizing an initiative designed to promote peer connection through community and contribution.

Known as PSET (Positive School Environment Team), a mix of sophomores, juniors, and seniors have volunteered to be student advocates that provide a framework for inclusion and acceptance into pre-existing programs and school community events and activities.

The Peer Empowerment Leaders follow the #RUTH method — Respect, Understanding, Trust, and Honesty.
