PLENTY OF PREPARATION

The cast spent 3 months together preparing for the show, and they became a family along the way.

The cast ranged from third to 12th-graders, and everyone brought their own skillsets to the table.

"It was a lot of fun working with the younger kids because they looked up to us throughout the entire process leading up to the show," said WCS junior Laney Nolette, who starred as Elsa.

"We get to see each other in the hallways now, and it's not often that you have high-schoolers with such a





strong connection with those younger kids, and I think that is one of those little things that becomes such a big takeaway from the experience. It really brought us together as we worked together."

Play practice lasted for about 2 hours each day before longer practices started a couple weeks before the curtain was raised.

PBIS Creates Student Support System

Willsboro CSD is committed to a school-wide approach that helps students learn positive behaviors and create a safe and supportive learning environment for all.

Positive Behavioral Interventions & Support (PBIS) has become a key element of the every-day routines of our school.

For those wondering what PBIS looks like in action, think of it as a team.

From students to teachers as well as families and our community, everyone works together to create a positive environment where everyone can learn and feel happy.

Here are some things to know about PBIS at WCS.

POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT

Students will earn positive reinforcement for doing what's expected of them throughout the day. Teachers and staff have Willsboro PRIDE tickets that will be distributed to students when they are seen doing what's expected of them in various locations.

Students will be able to redeem their tickets in the newly formed 'School Store'.

Items at the store can be 'purchased' using their PRIDE tickets and will range in price depending upon the item.

WHAT DOES PBIS DO?

PBIS helps teach students behavior expectations. It is also helps students develop social skills and positive relations with others. In turn, PBIS helps to improve school culture, reduce discipline referrals, and reduce suspensions. PBIS helps to improve academic, social, and emotional outcomes.

TIERED PBIS FRAMEWORK

Just as students learn academically at their own pace, students also learn behaviorally and emotionally on their own time. Some students will require re-teachings throughout the year to support their understanding of expectations across various locations within the school.

PBIS is set up to allow those re-teachings when needed. If a student is struggling with the expectations provided, more small group guidance and practice will be given as well as increased prompts and reminders to go along with increased school-family communication.

Capital Corner Update

Each year, included in the district budget, are

funds for capital outlay projects. These miniature capital projects are designed to allow the district to address needs as they arise while receiving 52% of the cost back in state aid the following year.



2023-24 CAPITAL OUTLAY

The 2023-2024 capital outlay project was completed earlier this school year.

This project focused on replacing the district's phone and public address system, which was outdated and unreliable. Now, each room within the school building has a new phone and working PA speaker, which ensures that important messages can be heard by all students and staff. These upgrades also added several features that will increase safety during emergency situations.

2024-25 CAPITAL OUTLAY

The 2024-2025 capital outlay project, scheduled to be completed this spring, includes the refinishing of the gym floor and the replacement of the gym wall mats. This work will increase student safety within this space while providing necessary maintenance to extend the life of the gym floor wood.

FUTURE CAPITAL PROJECT

In the next year, the district will be providing additional information on a future capital project to address larger maintenance needs. In 2025, the district, with its architects, will conduct a building conditions survey to identify our most pressing needs to be addressed in the future capital project. More information on the planning stages for this larger project will be shared over the next year.

PBIS COMBINED WITH POSITIVITY PROJECT (P2)

In past newsletters, you may remember having read about our Positivity Project. PBIS connects directly to our ongoing work with the Positivity Project. Through P2, students are learning the 24 character strengths behind the positive psychology approach to strong relationship building. Coupled with PBIS, P2 will now be stronger and help to reinforce the day-to-day learnings that students are having with our P2 lessons.

STUDENTS TAKE CENTERSTAGE

As Co-Director, Walsh had the opportunity to see different elements of the students' personalities come to life. "Seeing the amount of talent from the younger kiddos and the talent we had in the high school was great," Walsh said. "They were able to get out of their comfort zones. We had some pretty intense choreography, and the kids were able to express themselves in different ways."

Many students owned multiple roles, so that meant there was plenty of fun taking place behind stage with costume changes and much more.

Walsh was sewing dresses and other outfits during the shows to make sure things fit just right, and even with that bit of chaos, it was well worth it.

"One of the coolest things for me was some of the behind-the-scenes stuff that happens because it brings a new level of appreciation for the group you are working with," Reithel said. "I know I was laughing at times, and you need that."
