


DEAR COMMUNITY MEMBERS,

On April 8, 2025, the Willsboro Central School District Board of Education approved the proposed budget of \$11,173,349 for the 2025-2026 academic year, which community members will vote on May

20, 2025. This budget represents a modest spending increase of 1.69% and remains within the district's state-calculated tax cap limit.

The proposed budget fulfills the district's commitment to our community to utilize resources with maximum effectiveness and efficiency while prioritizing educational excellence. In addition to maintaining all existing programs and

WCS PREPARES FOR UPCOMING SCHOOL BUS MANDATE

As our school buses transport students to and from school as well as other special **CURRENT BUS FLEET** events, WCS prioritizes safety first.

Purchasing new school buses has become a high-priority item in the last few years following an upcoming New York State mandate that requires all schools to purchase electric busses starting in 2027.

Electric models are 2-3 times more expensive than traditional diesel buses and require costly infrastructure upgrades.

By replacing older vehicles ahead of the 2027 deadline, the district can greatly reduce the cost to the Willsboro community while allowing as much time as possible to prepare for the upcoming transition. This approach ensures a safe, reliable fleet is maintained while fiscally planning for this upcoming mandate.

Through a NYSERDA grant, WCS has undergone a transition study with an engineering and architectural company that will help further understand the impact and significant financial challenge the district is aiming to delay as long as possible to limit financial burden to the community.

with Debbie, who is extremely

dedication toward her students.

Debbie has certainly thought about what her last day will look like in June and knows there will be mixed emotions as she says her final goodbyes to her students.

"Every last day of school, we all

go outside and wave to the school buses and say goodbye, and I know that will be a little bit extra special this year, but it's all exciting at the same time," she said.

There are still plans to visit from time to time, however, and Debbie has already asked her friends and colleagues if she can come to school every now and then to read a story to students.

"I can't be away forever. I have to read a story every now and then," Debbie said.

As for the next chapter, there will certainly be some traveling, and she hopes to use her skillsets to her advantage in future opportunities.

First up in the retirement plans will be a cruise.

"I know during the first day of school this upcoming fall, I want to be doing something so I am not thinking about what I am missing here," Debbie said. "My goal is to be doing something epic on that first day, but my heart will always be here in Willsboro."

Coordinator of Transportation and Facilities Lucas Strong, along with Charlene Lobdell, Peter Sayward and Todd Gerding are the core of WCS transportation in addition to several dedicated substitute drivers.

"As a bus driver, you are the first person from school to have an interaction with a student to start the day," Strong said. "Saying 'Good Morning' to them means something. It brightens your day when you hear the kids on the bus and their stories. It makes you smile and laugh and starts the day off on a good note."

While days begin early and end late, the quartet of drivers commits itself to students. Whether it's an early-morning bus run or a late-night trip to and from a sporting event, the drivers' dedication never wavers.

"I feel very fortunate to have the team that I do," Strong said. "They are the backbone of the school."

While the district traditionally purchases new buses every other year, this year's budget proposes another bus purchase to proactively address our aging high-mileage fleet. Several buses are over 10 years old and approaching 150,000 miles.

WCS relies on its community to provide the support needed to acclimate to the pending mandates from NYS and needs further assistance to add to its fleet of busses.



"As a school district, having newer school buses enhances the safety of our students and community," Superintendent of Schools Dr. Justin Gardner said. "We want to ease the financial burden of our community through additional school bus purchase approvals before the 2027 mandate kicks in. Most importantly, we will continue to rely on our team of drivers and are thankful for their never-ending dedication to WCS."





WILLSBORO CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT

The 2025-26 capital outlay project will consist of work required to make necessary improvements to the district's clock and public address systems. As part of this project, aging and unreliable classroom clocks and public address speakers will be replaced with new digital models. The current equipment is over 20 years old and is no longer serviceable.

The replacement system will not only provide necessary upgrades for communication within the building but



will also enable additional safety features to be implemented throughout the district. These new digital clock/speaker units will integrate with the district's phone system, providing enhanced safety notification capabilities.

Through annual capital outlay projects, the state allows school districts to transfer general funds to the capital fund for building and/or



reconstruction projects, not to exceed \$100,000. Projects funded in this manner receive reimbursement from the state the following budget year, unlike traditional capital projects, which are reimbursed over a longer period of time. The state will reimburse the Willsboro Central School District for 52% of this project next year, resulting in a net local cost to the district of \$48,000.
